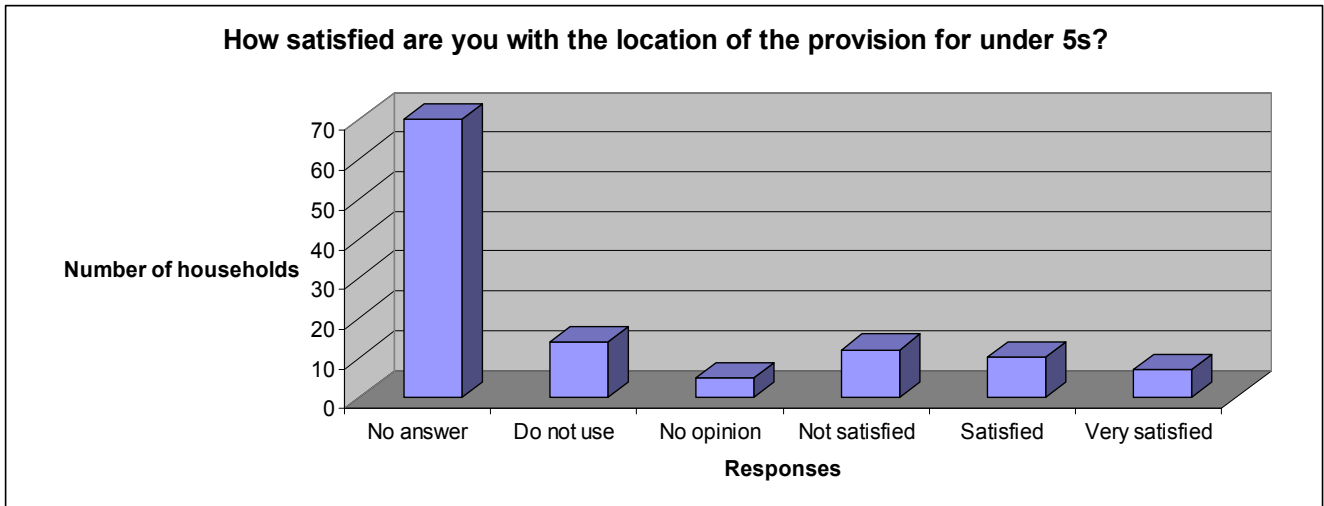


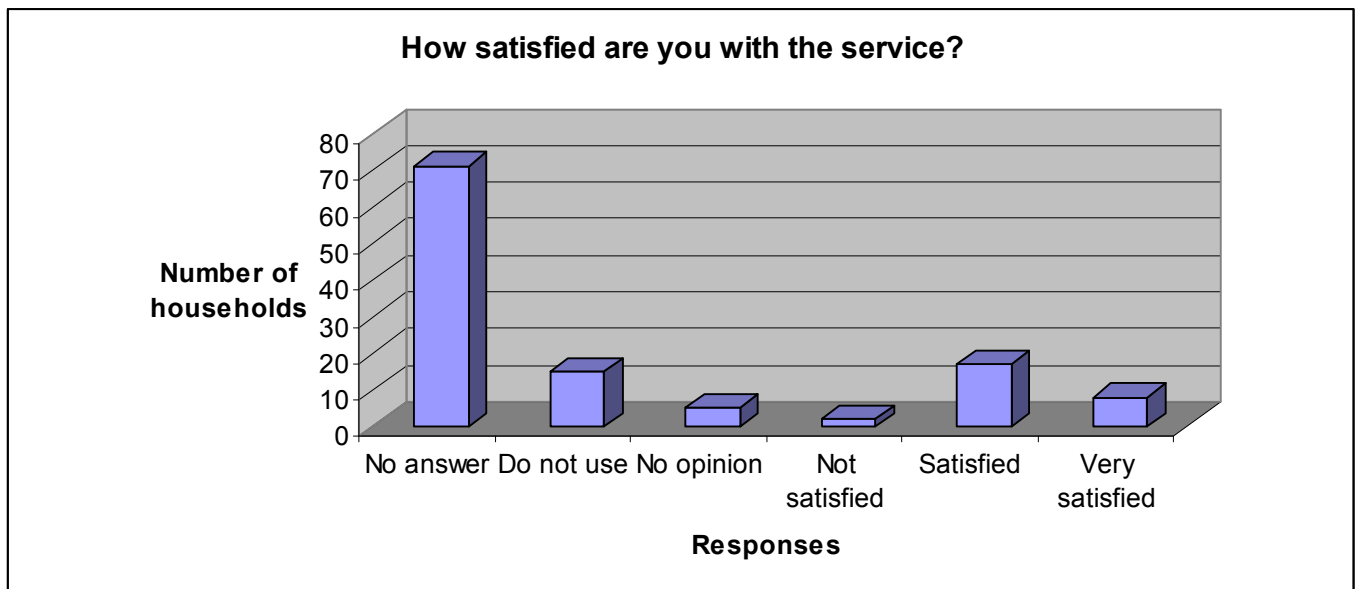

WHITMINSTER PARISH PLAN QUESTIONNAIRE RESULTS

SECTION 4 – EDUCATION

15a. When asking residents if they were satisfied with the location of provision for under 5s. Ignoring those that did not answer or did not use the provision, 55% of responses were not satisfied with the location of provision for under 5s.



When asking how satisfied they were with the service. Ignoring those that did not answer or did not use the provision, 78% of responses were satisfied or very satisfied with the service.

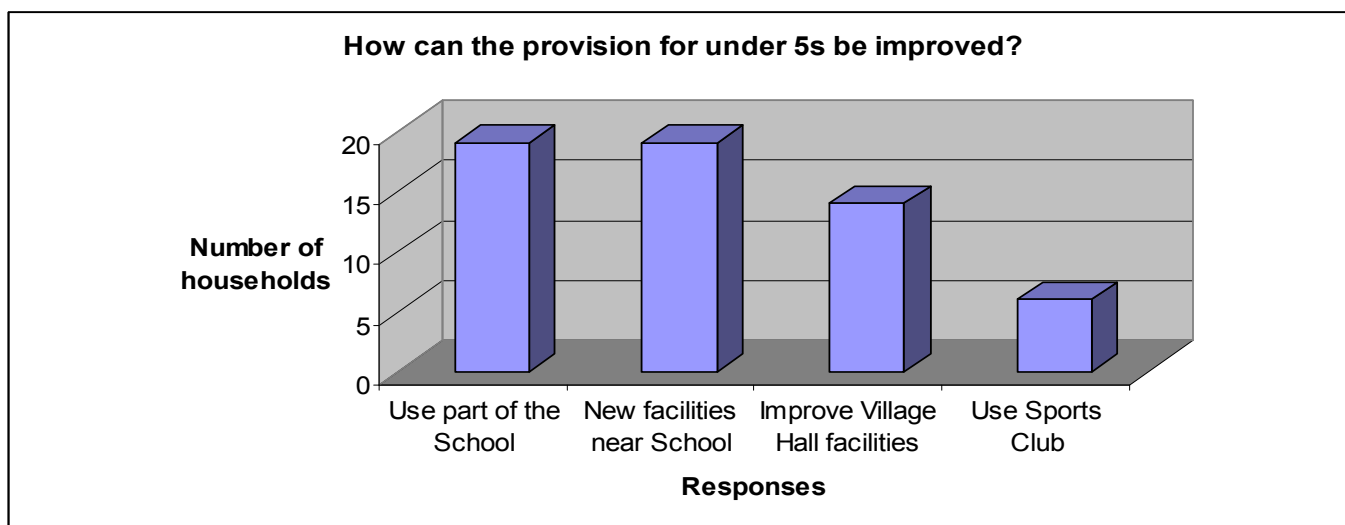
When asking how satisfied they were with the facilities. Ignoring those that did not answer or did not use the provision, 55% of responses were satisfied or very satisfied.



15b. When asking households to explain why they were not satisfied, answers included:

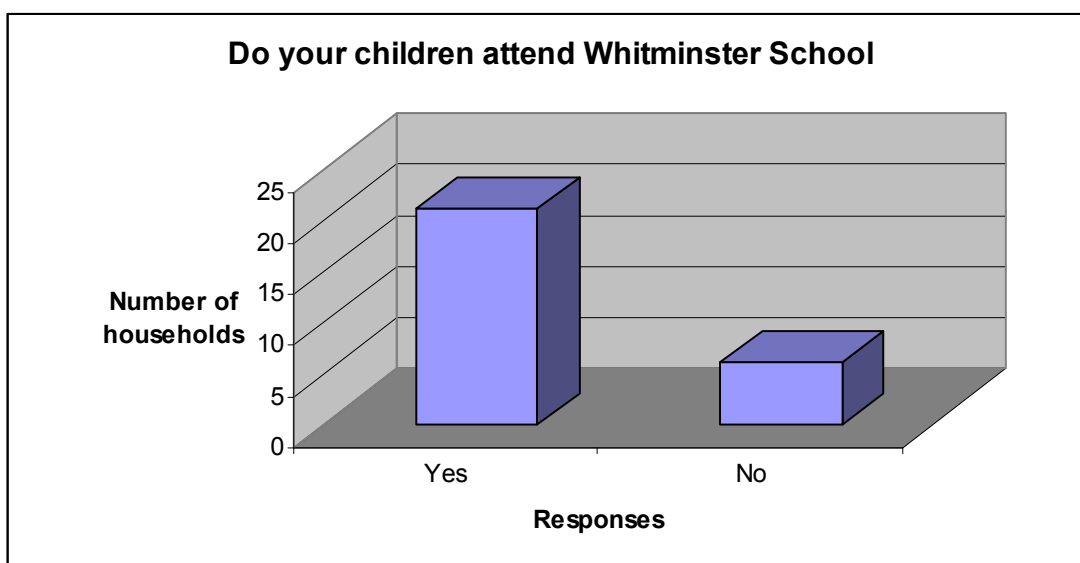
- The buildings are unsuitable for young children.
- Other playgroups including Frampton, had purpose built new facilities.
- Too close to the A38.
- Toilet facilities in village hall are not suitable for children.
- Facilities should be attached to the school, so that equipment can remain in location.
- Demanding and time consuming to move and store equipment after each session.
- Health and Safety issues – cleanliness after others including dogs have used the same facilities.

16. When asking how the provision for under 5s could be improved, 50% of households responded to this question and 66% of those responses stated that provision for under 5s should be at or close to the school.

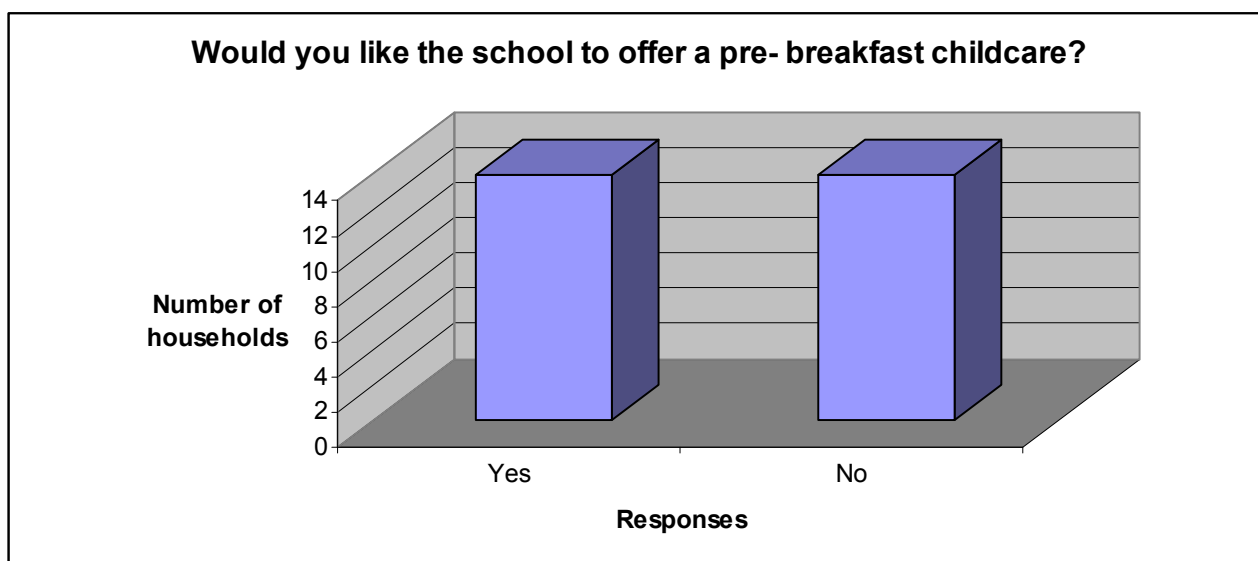
17a When asking residents if they had children, did they attend Whitminster school, 23% of households responded to this question and 78% of those responses stated that their children attended Whitminster school



17b When asking residents to explain why their children did not attend Whitminster School, the following reasons were identified:

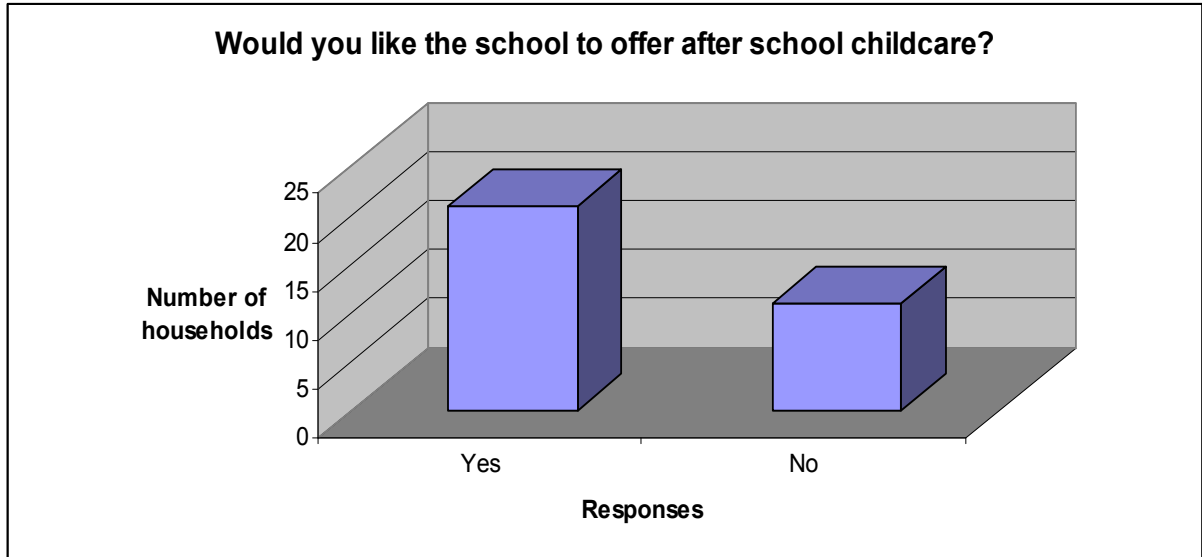
- Disagree with policy of putting children of different ages in the same class.
- Unhappy with the management of behaviour and discipline issues at the school.
- Poor reputation – few admissions to local Grammar Schools.

18a When asking residents if they would like the school to offer pre-breakfast childcare, only 24% of households answered this question, although 50% of those responses stated that they would like the school to offer pre-breakfast childcare, although.

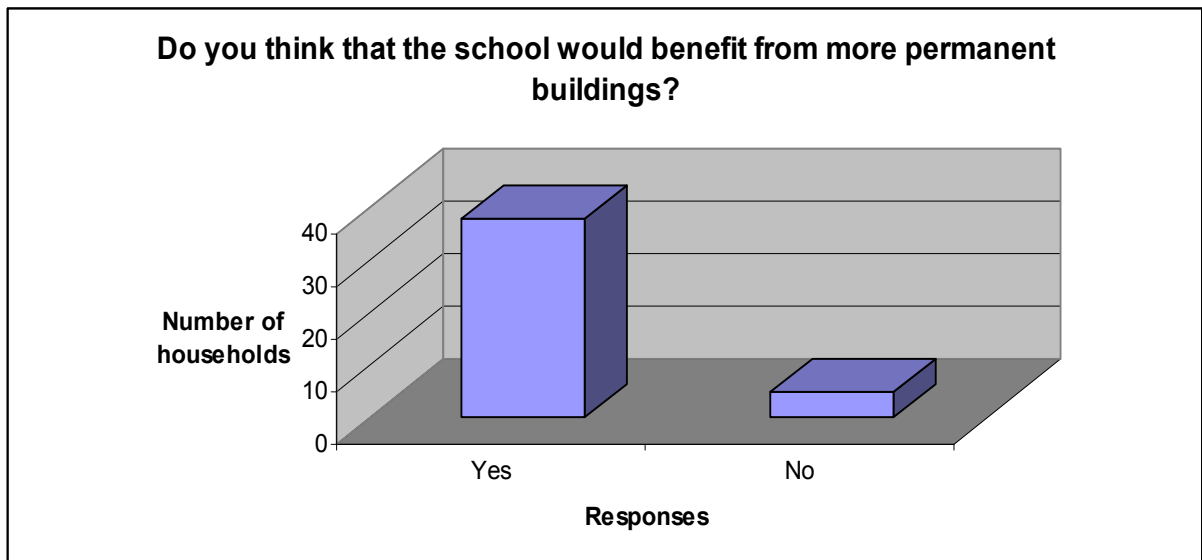

18b When asking residents if they would like the school to offer after-school childcare, 27% of households answered this question and 66% of those responses stated that they would like the school to offer after-school childcare.

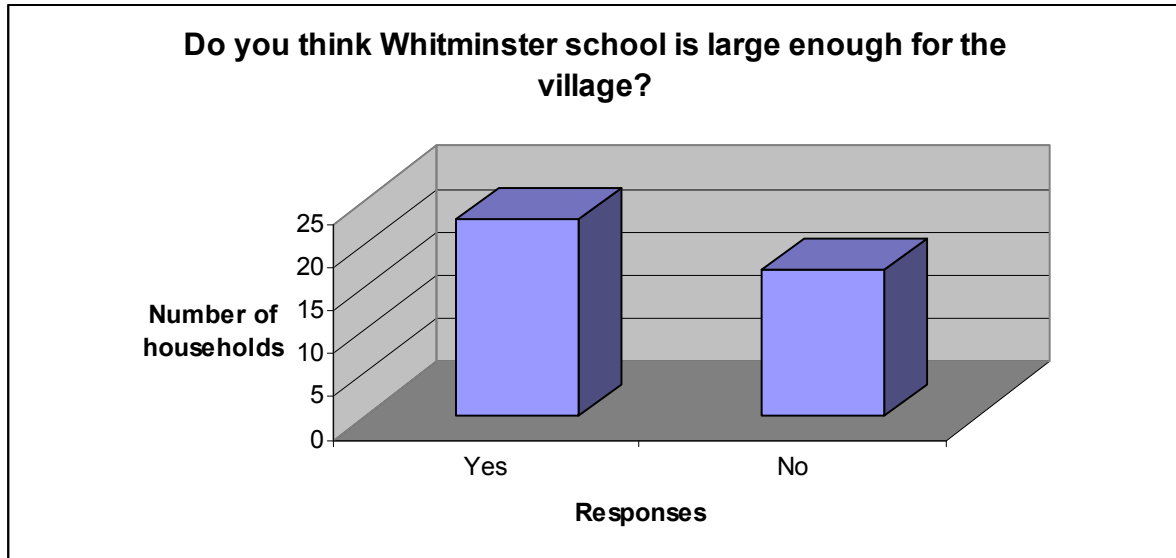

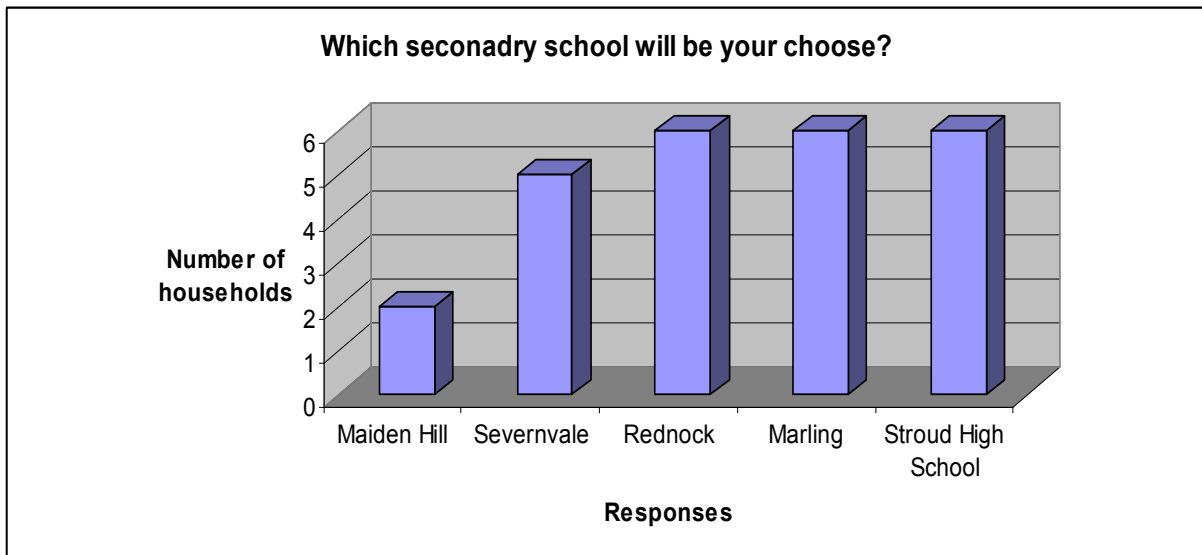

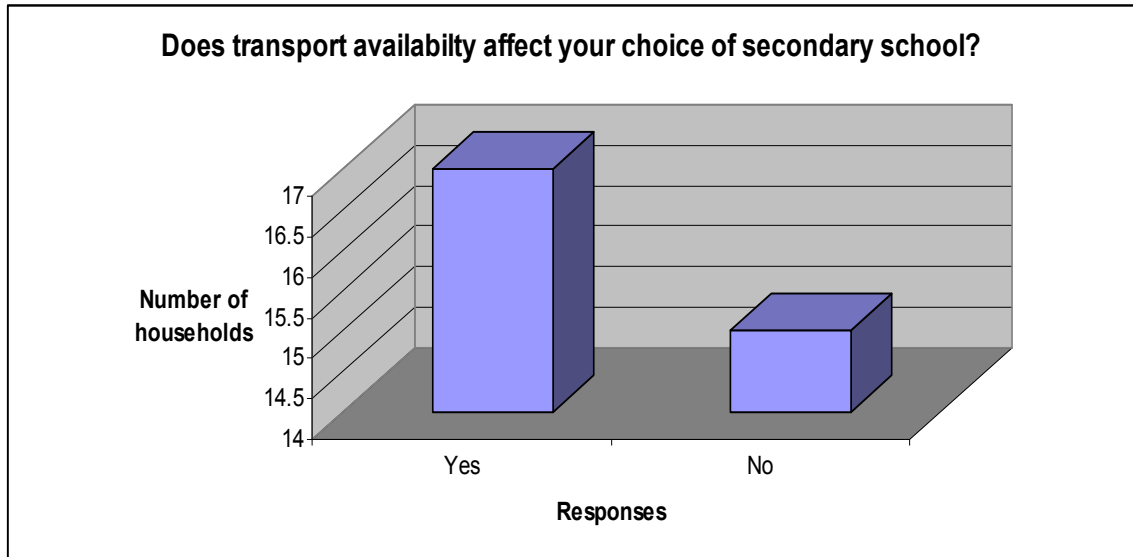


21 When asking residents which secondary school they would choose, 21% of households responded.
